
MESSAGE FROM MAYOR ETHAN SPENCER

I hate to be the bearer of bad news this month, but winter is right around the corner! The good news is that your village staff are prepared for the winter season. We are well stocked with road salt and our plows are ready to go. Snow removal ranks very high in importance among our residents, so I thought I'd share with you how we manage the plowing and salting. First, our crews focus on main roads, then on side streets with steep grades, and then neighborhood streets. In total there are 78 lane miles to plow in our Village. Our top concern is to ensure that emergency vehicles can safely and quickly get to their destination, and then of course, we strive to protect the safety of all. Salt is applied to the roads once they have been cleared of snow. We do not apply salt to snow covered roads. It is not effective to do that, it costs a lot of money, and it's worse for the environment. During a heavy, continuous snowstorm, salt application is focused on curves, hills, and intersections. We have automatic meters on our trucks that adjust the application rate depending on truck speed. These meters have also helped increase efficiency. Each year our salt is purchased through the State of Ohio consortium contract which allows for better buying power. For the last couple of years, Cargill has been the supplier. Did you know that Cargill mines the salt from under Lake Erie right near the flats? How's that for buying local? Given that salt usage can be difficult to predict, our contract gives us some flexibility, but we must commit to a minimum. Fortunately, we have a salt barn where we can carry over excess to the following year.

By the end of the year, I expect to make available to all residents a copy of the Village Survey results by posting a report on our website. I organized many of the comments and suggestions into categories and shared them with both our Roads & Safety Committee and our Facilities Committee. Council and the Village staff will work on identified issues and potential solutions. In addition, I will continue using this monthly letter to address feedback that we have received from you. For this month I am going to share some information about our three commissions: The Parks Commission, The Green Commission, and the Diversity & Inclusion Commission. Some residents asked about Village time and resources that are spent on these commissions. First, let me say that all three of these commissions are resident led and made up of volunteers. Second, they are advisory in nature. Any actions taken need to be approved in advance by the Mayor and in some cases the Village Council, including any expenditures. In 2023, the total number of Village dollars spent by all three together is less than \$500 to date. Lastly, all three have had a positive impact on our community by organizing events, furthering community engagement, and advising me and my staff. MESSAGE FOR RESIDENTS IN THE ORANGE SCHOOL DISTRICT:

The Orange School Board is proposing a 1.5 mill Permanent Improvement Levy on the November 7 ballot to continue to fund infrastructure needs.

Permanent Improvement Levies generate funds which can only be used to pay for long-term assets with an estimated useful life greater than five years. HVAC, roofs, furniture, roads, sidewalks, security, technology, vehicles and other building updates are just some of the expenses which can be paid for with PI funds. Permanent improvement funds are not allowed to pay for salaries, wages, benefits, or supplies.

Due to the expiration of a 2.2 mill bond debt retirement levy, passage of this levy would result in a net tax decrease of \$24.50 per \$100,000 of valuation for district property owners as compared to what they are currently paying.

ORDINANCES & RESOLUTIONS:

The following Ordinances and Resolutions were passed in October:

Ordinance 2023-48 – authorizes the Mayor to accept two perpetual drainage easements for the installation and maintenance of two storm water basins and appurtenances upon the properties known as PPN 912-26-022 and 912-26-023 Giles Road.

Ordinance 2023-49 – authorizes Change Order No. 1 with Chagrin Valley Paving, Inc. for the Chagrin Boulevard Resurfacing Project, in the net decrease amount of \$109,611.48 to reconcile and close out the contract.

Ordinance 2023-50 – an appropriations ordinance, which is a monthly financial housekeeping item.
